"As an antidote to their suffering, James exhorts them to pray. As noted above, prayer is essential to enduring affliction. God is the ultimate source of comfort, leading the apostle Paul to describe Him as the 'Father of mercies and God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our affliction' (2 Cor. 1:3–4)...When life is difficult, when believers are weak in faith, weary with persecution, and crushed by affliction, they must continually plead with God to comfort them. That is a basic spiritual truth, but one often forgotten." – John MacArthur, The MacArthur New Testament Commentary, James, p. 277

DAY 3 | Do Not Swear | Read James 5:12

1. In James 5:12, what command is given?

DAY 4 The Prayers of the Righteous Read James 5:13-20

"The word for "sick" in verse 14 is not referring primarily to those who are physically sick but to those who have become spiritually weak through their suffering. "The weak are those who have been defeated in the spiritual battle, who have lost the ability to endure their suffering. They are the fallen spiritual warriors, the exhausted, weary, depressed, defeated Christians. They have tried

to draw on God's power through prayer, but have lost motivation, even falling into sinful attitudes. Having hit bottom, they are not able to pray effectively on their own. In that condition, the spiritually weak need the help of the spiritually strong (cf. 1Thess. 5:14)." – John MacArthur, The MacArthur New Testament Commentary, James, p. 277

3.	In verse 16, what exhortation did James give? How can isolation, or pretending that things are going well when they're not, be dangerous for Christians?
4.	In verses 17–18, whom did James use as a model of righteous prayer, and how is that prayer described? (You can also skim 1 Kings 17–18 for reasons that his prayers were effective.)
5.	According to verses 19–20, what will God do for the person who is brought back from wandering from the truth?
	 a. How do Psalms 32:1 and 85:2 help you understand the concept of covering sin described in verse 20?
