

The Second Coming and the Millennial Reign

We teach that, after the tribulation period, Christ will come to earth to occupy the throne of David (Matthew 25:31; Luke 1:31-33; Acts 1:10-11; 2:29-30) and establish His messianic kingdom for 1,000 years on the earth (Revelation 20:1-7). During this time the resurrected saints will reign with Him over Israel and all the nations of the earth (Ezekiel 37:21-28; Daniel 7:17-22; Revelation 19:11-16). This reign will be preceded by the overthrow of the Antichrist and the False Prophet, and by the removal of Satan from the world (Daniel 7:17-27; Revelation 20:1-7).

We teach that the kingdom itself will be the fulfillment of God's promise to Israel (<u>Isaiah 65:17-25</u>; <u>Ezekiel 37:21-28</u>; <u>Zechariah 8:1-17</u>) to restore them to the land that they forfeited through their disobedience (<u>Deuteronomy 28:15-68</u>). The result of their disobedience was that Israel was temporarily set aside (<u>Matthew 21:43</u>; <u>Romans 11:1-26</u>), but will again be awakened through repentance to enter into the land of blessing (<u>Jeremiah 31:31-34</u>; <u>Ezekiel 36:22-32</u>; Romans 11:25-29).

We teach that this time of our Lord's reign will be characterized by harmony, justice, peace, righteousness, and long life (Isaiah 11; 65:17-25; <u>Ezekiel 36:33-38</u>), and will be brought to an end with the release of Satan (<u>Revelation 20:7</u>).
